### **BRITISH PHYSICS OLYMPIAD – Report by Mr Sutherland, Physics**

On 1 March we had 51 students complete the Intermediate Physics Challenge as a part of the British Physics Olympiad. This marked the culmination of over a month of preparation including three after school sessions. The level of commitment shown by these Year 11 students is to be commended. The paper sat as part of the challenge is very difficult and stretches even very able students to the limit of their problem-solving ability. Not all students are willing to put themselves in a position where they are challenged so much, and where even scoring any marks on a paper puts them amongst the top physicists of their age in the country. Well done to all who volunteered!

Our Year 12 physicists also took part in the Senior Physics Challenge as a part of the next stage in their Olympiad journey. The paper they sat was excellent preparation for any student who wishes to pursue physics related subjects beyond Sixth Form and had some incredibly challenging questions. Students had to estimate how long it would take to walk to the moon, calculate how many molecules of water from a cup of tea once passed through Julius Caesar and how much earlier a giraffe sees the sun set before a lion! Well done to all participants, regardless of outcome.

## **CROWN COURT JUDGE VISITS BGS LAW STUDENTS – Report by Mr Mitchell, Law**

The Law department, with support on the day from Mrs Shales, was delighted to welcome His Honour Mr Justice Enright to the school to deliver a session with one of the Year 12 Law groups. An experienced Circuit Judge, he sits to hear serious criminal cases in the Crown Court. He brought his Crown Court wig and his ceremonial wig to show to the students.

In a wide-ranging and fascinating talk, Mr Justice Enright encouraged the students to engage in a discussion about legal careers; he introduced a series of criminal cases and asked the students to assess whether the correct sentences had been given to criminal offenders; and he revealed to the students why he was passionate about the law, referring to the importance of the rule of law and human rights, and explaining a family link to the Anglo-Irish War (1919-21) that underpinned his points.



The students had an opportunity to ask the judge some questions about his views and experiences, with Hope Tivey asking a memorable last question about whether he had ever sent the "wrong person" to prison, which led to a very reflective response from the judge about crime and punishment. It was a fitting end to an excellent session, one that students will remember for years to come.

The Law students must be commended for providing such an exemplary audience for the judge; they listened intently to every word, and responded very well when put on the spot for their views.

Mr Justice Enright has very kindly supported some BGS Law students with judicial shadowing opportunities, and he is hoping to return to the school to deliver a session for the other Year 12 Law group. The Law department has very good links with local courts and with local practitioners, and is always open to forging further links with other legal professionals and those involved in law enforcement in the area.

Thank you to Mrs Shales, Head of Sixth Form, and Mrs Elliot, Careers and UCAS Coordinator, for supporting the organisation and delivery of this event.

## **LINCOLN UNIVERSITY, CREATIVE FORCES TRIP - Report by Arthur Turner, Year 8**

On Tuesday 26 March I had the opportunity, together with students from different year groups, to visit Lincoln University for a 'Creative Forces' day. This day was organised for students who have a member of their family who is currently serving or has served in one of the Armed Forces.

When we arrived at the University, we were taken into a lecture room with students from other schools and we were given sheets of paper with lots of questions which required us to go and speak to different people in the room and find out about them and their experiences of the Forces. I personally found it quite enjoyable as I got to meet a lot of new people from different schools and learnt how they were affected by being Forces children.

Next, we were taken for a tour of the University grounds where we learnt about all the different buildings and the subjects you could study there. I thought this was the best part of the trip as we actually went inside some of the buildings and I got to sit in a room that was designed like a courtroom for anyone who wanted to study Law - it felt so real sat there like I was in a proper courtroom!

After lunch, which was thoughtfully provided by the University, we went back into the lecture centre and did an exercise looking at possible career paths in the future and we filled out a sort of 'future job planner' thinking about what we might need to do in order to have a certain career in the future.

Overall, the day was very enjoyable as I learnt new things and the trip completely changed my opinion of what university might be like in the future and made me consider whether it would be a good option for me. It was also beneficial to meet other students from a similar background and have time to talk to them and hear about their experiences.

It was a valuable opportunity to learn skills helpful to applying to any university – not just Oxbridge. Many subject talks were on offer. 'In history, we were introduced to the history application process, including written work and HATs, as well as what life is like studying history at Oxbridge. After the session, my decision to study history became more certain'.

'Computer Science was one of the most informative talks, guiding us through the course content to show us the difference between studying a STEM subject at Oxbridge and other universities. We had the opportunity to speak to Alex Chadwick, a senior postdoc researcher who also helped design some admissions test, as well as a first year undergrad'.

'The talk for medicine was really helpful in informing us about taking medicine and gave us important information on the UCAT exam such as how to book the exam and then prepare for it.'


