Message from Headteacher

It is quite remarkable just how much can be packed into such a short half term. Over the past couple of weeks alone, we have seen Year 8 students taking part in their 'No Pens Day' activities to promote oracy, Year 12 geographers heading to Snowdonia, countless athletics fixtures and competitions taking place, and huge numbers of Year 8 students participating in, and enthusiastically supporting, the recent interform football competition on the astro. As always, opportunities such as these rely upon a great deal of support behind the scenes from staff and volunteers who give their time so generously throughout the year.

The final half term of the academic year promises much more of the same in many different ways. Alongside ongoing trips, visits and enrichment opportunities, including our Year 8 Spanish trips, we also look forward to welcoming prospective students and families into School through our Open Evening and transition events for both our new Year 7 intake and prospective Sixth Form students.

Year 12 Geography Trip to Snowdonia

On Thursday 14 May, the Year 12 Geography group set off on their biggest journey yet to Snowdonia, Wales, aiming to explore how glaciers have shaped the natural environment of the region. We started the day under sunny skies and high hopes in Bourne. However, the moment we stepped off the coach, Wales greeted us with fierce winds and pouring rain, quickly revealing who had come unprepared.

We hiked 4 kilometres along the Miner's Track from the Pen-y-Pass car park, climbing approximately 160 metres in elevation. Along the route, we encountered a range of glacial landforms, including corries, tarns, roche moutonnées and many more, demonstrating both the erosional and depositional power of glaciers.



Once back on the coach after our walk through Snowdon, we headed for the youth hostel in Llanberis, though not before tackling one final steep uphill walk carrying our bags. After an eventful dinner, a select few later continued on to a nearby waterfall, where we were rewarded with stunning scenery and even witnessed people rappelling down the waterfall itself.

Many ended the evening playing UNO and chess in the youth hostel's lounge before heading back to their rooms, preparing for an early start the next day.



The second day began with a short coach ride followed by a hike to the source of the Nant Ffrancon Valley: Cwm Idwal, an iconic corrie surrounded by impressive glacial features, particularly its steep back wall and pronounced rock lip. During our fieldwork, we used OS maps to identify and analyse these features within the landscape.

One of the most unexpected moments of the trip came during our group photo, when two fighter jets suddenly flew through the valley at low altitude, likely carrying out military training exercises due to the valley's suitable topography.



After this memorable encounter, we travelled further down the Nant Ffrancon Valley to carry out a range of fieldwork investigations. This included mapping striations on top of a roche moutonnée to determine the direction of glacial movement that once dominated the valley. We also used ranging poles and clinometers to create a slope profile by measuring gradients at 2 metre intervals. Additionally, we investigated sediment sizes along the bank of a misfit stream using quadrats, helping us understand how modern rivers continue to erode and sort pre-existing glacial deposits over time.

As the trip came to an end, we took in the scenery one last time from the coach as we reluctantly left Snowdonia behind. Overall, the visit provided an unforgettable opportunity to experience glaciated landscapes firsthand while applying the geographical skills and knowledge learned in the classroom.

We would like to thank the Geography teachers and staff who made this trip possible.

This is a residential event, taking place in Leeds, for students aged 14–16 and participants are selected from the top 1.5% of pupils who took part in the Intermediate Mathematical Challenge which was held in January 2026.

The National Mathematics Summer Schools are designed for young people with an interest in maths. They promote mathematical thinking and provide an opportunity for participants to meet other like-minded students. Only one student per school is invited to attend, and the last pupil to attend from BGS was in 2024 as schools cannot send students two years in a row.

This is a fantastic achievement for Seb and recognition of his success in both the Intermediate Maths Challenge and also the Olympiad for which he also qualified.

Woolsthorpe Manor Trip

On Tuesday 12 May, Science club went to Woolsthorpe Manor, the birthplace of Isaac Newton. We learnt about three sectors - light, forces and his house and life growing up. Something you may find interesting is that in different mediums, light changes speed and directions! This is called refraction. Isaac is also famous for his work on forces, and we did lots of different practical work showing his different laws. During the tour of his house, we learnt more about his life and how he went to school in Grantham and also built a working model of a windmill whilst he was growing up! We did learn much more - this is just the surface! We have really enjoyed our science journey.

Going to Woolsthorpe Manor was actually more interesting than we expected because it made science feel less theoretical and more connected to real life. Seeing where Sir Isaac Newton lived and worked gave a better understanding of how his ideas developed.

The famous apple tree was cool to see, but the best part was learning how Newton used observation and logical thinking to explain things people didn't fully understand at the time.





What stood out to us most was how many different areas of science Newton influenced, especially gravity, forces, and light. The prism experiments were probably the most interesting because they showed how white light can be separated into a spectrum of colours, which linked directly to what we learn in science lessons. Being able to see demonstrations instead of only reading about them made the concepts easier to remember.

The trip also showed that scientific discoveries don't just happen randomly - they come from asking questions and thinking deeply about problems.

Overall, it was a good experience because it connected classroom science to an actual historical place and made the topics feel more meaningful.
