A big thank you to everyone who helped and attended the very successful Sixth Form Open Evening on Tuesday of this week. The ease with which volunteers can be found is always a good barometer of positive culture and I am delighted that 270 of our existing Sixth Form students stepped forward to be guides, car park assistants or subject ambassadors on the night. Speaking to parents during and after the event, there was a huge amount of positivity about the work of the students throughout the evening and academic departments did a fabulous job of informing and guiding prospective Sixth Formers as to what A-Level study means and what can be expected in specific subject areas. We had 163 students and their families attend from other education providers in addition to our own Year 11 students and it was an evening which should fill us all with pride. Wonderful stuff – a great advert for the high-quality educational community that we know we are.

I would also like to congratulate Ben Pennycook in Year 11 and William Craft in Year 13. Both were presented with awards at the 2022 South Kesteven Community Champions celebrations in October. Ben is an advocate for anti-bullying and became an 'Ambassador' last year having completed training through the Diana Award in School. Ben gave a wonderfully positive and supportive assembly to Year 7 students at the start of the year and then took the initiative to establish a lunchtime 'Build Your Confidence' club for younger year groups with the aim of developing self-esteem and promoting wellbeing amongst his fellow students whilst advocating the importance of prioritising kindness towards others. As a result, he received the wonderful *Inspirational Young Person* Award. He said of this:



"After my training with the Diana Award, I had the idea to start the Build Your Confidence Club. The club offers younger students a place to build their self-esteem and confidence through team-building

exercises and learning new skills. I believe that being kind to others makes you feel better about yourself which is why the club's motto is: be good, do good, feel good."



William meanwhile was presented with the impressive *Neil Smith: Beyond the Call of Duty Award*. He arrived on the scene of a motorcycle accident on the A15 near Baston to find the rider unconscious and not breathing while the bike itself burned. William used skills learned from the Bourne Army Cadet Detachment to administer CPR and save the life of the injured rider. He also received a letter of commendation from the Operational Policing Inspector for the quality of assistance he provided and the confidence he displayed under such difficult circumstances. Speaking of his award he said:

"I did not know the backstory about the person this award is in memory of so that's quite something. It makes you stop and think what a difference CPR can make. It's something we learn at Cadets and something everyone can learn at work.

A reminder that all students have access to the amazing online learning resource SENECA.

Students need only to log in to the website https://app.senecalearning.com/login by clicking on the

E Continue with Microsoft box and using their school login details.



The School's subscription to **SENECA** provides students with an excellent resource to work independently on any subject of their choosing; this supports the School's '*Building Better Learners*' Programme at Key Stage 3 and our overarching curriculum philosophy of producing independent learners.

SENECA offers further teaching of content covered in the classroom, and then marks answers to assesses their understanding. The AI built into **SENECA** also removes questions, which students have

previously got correct and focuses more on areas they have found difficult. Students also receive points for themselves, and their school, for all of the learning that they complete. With the exception perhaps of **Dr Frost** in Mathematics, which is superb, I am not aware of a comparably effective product. **SENECA** is excellent and I strongly recommend it.

On 2 November, the Spanish department held a workshop about the Day of the Dead (Día de los Muertos) for Year 7 and Year 8 students.

This workshop taught students about the unique and special traditions celebrated in Latin-American countries, especially Mexico where it's originally from.

Firstly, we played a fun and educational quiz testing our current knowledge on the Day of the Dead. Then we learnt about the event, the traditional bread offered to the dead (Pan de Muertos), the common and beautiful flowers (Cempasúchiles - Marigolds) used to decorate Mexican altars (ofrendas).

Secondly, we learnt how to build Mexican altars and the elements that are included. These altars are built in homes and made to bring back loved ones from the Land of the Dead. Altars must include candles, sugar skulls, a photo of the loved one, marigold flowers and offerings such as drinks and *pan de muerto*.

Lastly, to end the interesting workshop, we designed our very own sugar skulls! These are brightlycoloured skulls which are used to symbolise the Day of the dead. This activity was very fun and aweinspiring for many students.

We all agreed that it was a wonderful workshop and would recommend it to other students in the future to come and join us!
