This week we have seen significant successes in multiple areas of School life. Our Cross Country athletes performed extremely well at the National Finals in Leeds last weekend, the Senior Girls' team coming 25th and the Senior Boys' team coming 4th with star runner Harry Hewitt winning the individual event. An amazing achievement – well done to Harry and all the other runners who took part. Thanks to Mr Ray, Miss Smith and Mr Sheppard for giving their time to allow the runners to compete.

We saw our musicians on the stage at the turning on of the Christmas Lights in Bourne on Saturday and we watched our U12 (Year 7) Boys Football team win a National Cup match against Becket School in Nottingham which takes them through to the last 32 of the competition. Well done once again to all who took part: to Mr Graves for overseeing success on the football pitch and to Mr Tomlinson for organising the music, bass or no bass! Congratulations also, to our Year 8 Girls Football squad who won a tournament at Lincoln City and are on their own Road to Wembley should they repeat this impressive feat at the next competition in Derby. And finally, a big thank you to all who helped with the successful Year 8 trip to the Fun Farm. I have yet to visit this particular local attraction and look forward to seeing just what it is that makes it so popular sometime in the future!

We also welcomed six uniform suppliers into School to pitch to us for the new uniform contract, a very interesting process that involved a number of students directly and one that created a lot of comments when all students were able to see sample uniform pieces left by potential suppliers in a mini lunchtime fashion show on Thursday. It is important to clarify a few points at this stage: the final decision has not been made yet and there will be no requirement for existing students to buy a new uniform when we make the change. We will gradually cascade the new uniform into School over time so that our families are not required to spend money on new garments unnecessarily. We are pleased to be able to confirm that the new uniform will be gender neutral by featuring trouser and skirt options for all including ties, it will remove the differentiation between boys and girls in terms of uniform colour and cost, and will also create a brand identity that will be clearly our own. We are working hard to drive costs down and limit the number of bespoke garments. A further detailed communication will follow when the tender process is complete but meanwhile it was pleasing to see so many students, above and beyond individual tutor group uniform representatives, take an active interest in the direction of the new uniform.

Finally, I would like to congratulate in writing all Year 11 students who received their mock examination grades today to be followed by written examination reports next week. They have been a credit to themselves and their School in the way they conducted themselves through the examination and feedback process. I know many have learned valuable, sometimes hard, lessons and will be much the better for having successfully battled their way through this tough challenge. I hope all in Year 11 will take some well-earned rest over the holiday when it comes, self-evaluate where they can individually improve going forward and return in the New Year determined and empowered to hit the heights in 2023.

As Year 7 students develop their Independent Learning Skills as part of the BBL Programme, Year 8 students are taught how to develop their oracy skills. As part of the School's drive to make our students become better speakers and listeners, Tuesday 13 December will witness the first ever NO PENS DAY for Year 8.

The main aim of the day is to show students that they can learn effectively in other ways besides writing. It is true that our education system is set up to prioritise the quality of our students' ability to write; with the exception of the odd practical exam and foreign language oral exam, GCSE exams are graded almost exclusively on the candidate's ability as a writer. On a daily basis, our students do a lot of writing and this will not change. However, students who are taught to use the same formal vocabulary and structures that they use in essays, when they speak, will benefit enormously both academically and in a wider social context.

Teachers have planned an exciting array of lessons for Tuesday, all of which will see fantastic learning take place without students writing; lessons on the day will involve lots of speaking and listening.

The games were extremely fast paced, and every second counted as each game only lasted only 4 minutes. In our 10 games (we played each school twice) we won 7, drew 2 and lost just 1. This consisted of scoring an amazing 15 goals and conceding just 1! Unsurprisingly we gained enough points to win the SuperZone tournament. An own goal in the last minute of the semi-final against Boston Grammar in the Spalding/Boston Playoff meant we didn't manage to win the whole tournament on the day, however, far more importantly the brilliant performances in the group mean we progress to the regional round (if there is one this year).

The week then finished with our highly anticipated National Cup Round 4 fixture against Becket School from Nottingham. Their teacher delighted in telling me that their 2 Nottingham Forest Academy players excelled in their Round 3 win! It was clear it was going to be a very tough game.

I decided to keep our amazing win against a typically strong Carre's Grammar team in the last round quiet!

We dominated the game from the first whistle to the last. In all honesty, our 3-1 victory flattened Becket. It could have been a lot more. Although it's probably unfair of me to single out individuals for praise as the whole team have been outstanding the performances of Ethan Lake and Rohan Lesiw have been as good as I have witnessed in my 10 years at BGS. Rohan was so good in fact that the 2 Nottingham Forest



Academy boys playing in midfield were both chasing his shadow as he danced around them with the ball glued to his feet time after time!

This team continue to amaze me with their mature, professional and classy performances on the pitch. They have won every game they have played. As well as being in the National Cup they sit top of the South Lincs League and remain in the County Cup. After a bye in Round 1 of the National Cup, they had a comprehensive win against Neale Wade, and an even more impressive win against Kesteven and Grantham Girls School, scoring 25 and conceding just 2 goals across both games. Unfortunately, a narrow 1-0 loss in a game we had the majority of the play meant we went out in Round 4 (last 64 in the country) against Spalding High. We would get our revenge against Spalding High....

On Friday, we were invited by Lincoln City F.C. to take part in this Year's Utilita Cup, held on the 4G astroturf at the LFC Stadium. The Utilita Girls Cup is for U13 girls that culminates in a grand final prior to the Papa John's Trophy Final at Wembley Stadium in April. We were not sure how the day would pan out, and a little skeptical after seeing so many teams there (13 in total).

We need not have worried.

The schools were split into 2 groups, with the top 4 from each group progressing to the quarter finals. After winning all 4 group games (scoring 11 without conceding a single goal) we then won the quarter final 2-0 and then beat Branston Community Academy 1-0 in the semi-final.

The final was a little more tricky. A very cagey affair with local school Spalding High could not be decided, even after extra time, and the game finished 0-0. The girls somehow kept their composure (unlike me who was a nervous wreck) and won the sudden death penalty shoot-out 5-4!

Winning the tournament means we will represent Lincoln City (wearing their kit) at the Regional Final round hosted by Rotherham United at Sheffield Hallam University playing against seven other schools representing EFL teams including Derby County and Hull City in January... and is one step closer to playing at Wembley.

CROSS COUNTRY ENGLISH SCHOOLS FINALS – *Report by Mr Ray and Mr Sheppard*

In a first for Bourne Grammar School, Harry Hewitt, Year 13, took home an unparalleled race victory in the final of the English School Cross Country Cup Final, an achievement that has never been equaled in Bourne Grammar Cross Country history. This race win represents Harry's strongest achievement to date and yet, perhaps just a stepping stone to potential future successes.

The race was impeccably run by Harry who, from the first lap, got into a dogfight with the eventual second placed athlete. Whilst his opponent burned energy trying to create space and gaps in the first lap, Harry was patient and waited until the second to unleash a short burst to create a 5 metre gap on his rival which turned out to be a decisive one which only grew over time. Coming over the line Harry had the opportunity to celebrate with a 'H' sign which may be seen more in the future and was swiftly whisked away for media interviews.

The Senior Boys team as a whole did a great job in order to equal the best ever team performance of 4th place, just outside of the podium positions. Upon leaving at the end of this year, Harry will pass on the baton on to his understudy Seb Beedell who came 10th this year who, with health and fitness permitting will be setting his sights on emulating Harry's success next year. Of the top 4 for the team, 3 of them were young in the competition with Seb in Year 12 followed by the Year 11's Johan Coughlan coming 45th and

Thomas Preston coming in 30 seconds later showing that the strength of the team will continue in future. Rounding off the team were Alex and Dan Galpin who have been stalwarts of the cross country team having been part of their second 4th place finish in their time at the School.



For the Intermediate Girls, the race was a fierce one run in brilliant fashion by the full complement of athletes. Yvette Annis raced swiftly off the line to allow her team to get out quickly behind her, and led the team home while Faith Perkins showed real strength and quality technique throughout in a confident performance. Millie Doud equally had a strong run which evidenced a good improvement over recent months to peak at the right time in the competition. The next two athletes Charlotte Smith and Lois Cox were again a year young in the competition and acquitted themselves very well, showing they will be future leaders of the Intermediate Girls team. Millie Herrick ran a tough race after a recent illness but nonetheless should be proud to have run the best race she could under the circumstances, having helped her team to a regional victory in the previous round. The girls team finished 23rd overall, several places higher than their performance in the previous year.

Our three Year 12 students, led the Senior Girls team home in a team position of 23rd with Erin Cox finishing foremost in 48th position. Hannah Taylor and Charlotte Cullen ran very well paced races to show a quality which has been present through their school careers. Madison Prince and Lily Rundle in Year 11 rounded off the team in their second National Final. After their performance last year, we were expecting much of the same from the pair-the girls maintained their pace and by picking off other athletes during the race. It will be an interesting cross country season next year to see the senior team joined by the four strong runners currently in Year 10 creating selection problems for us as staff but adding strength in depth to the senior team.

Thank you to the parents and friends who gave their time to travel to Leeds and support the squads and a thank you to all coaches who have over the years contributed to the strength of our athletes and the positivity with which cross country and athletics is regarded in the school. The next race will be the Lincolnshire Schools Cross Country Championships on Saturday 14th January at Burghley Park, Stamford, where almost 60 students from the school have been selected to represent South Lincolnshire. This should offer the top 14 in each age group automatic qualification to run for Lincolnshire at the Anglian Championships in early February. For students who wish to train for upcoming races it is important that they commit to continued training throughout the year whether that be through sessions ran through external athletics clubs or the running sessions led by Mr Sheppard on Mondays and Wednesdays which are for all students to improve fitness. Certainly, this year we have a growing number who are committing to this and feeling the improvement.
