# EXCEPTIONAL SEASON FINALLY DRAWS TO A CLOSE - Report by Mr Ray, PE

An unusually long cross country season finally concluded last week with the completion of the Fenland relays held at Hampton College in Peterborough. Delayed due to very bad weather mid-March, the 1.2k course is completed by a team of 4 in much the same way as the 4x400m athletics version. Despite the loss of power and closure of the School, many students remained determined to compete and it was with great frustration that we could only accommodate a skeleton squad of 4 teams of 4 (1 per age group) rather than the usual (and planned) 15 teams across the age groups.

The Junior Boys and Girls ran first with strong performances all round. Unfortunately, the Boys faced very strong opposition from Stamford School who literally ran away with the race and our boys finishing 4th overall, unable to add the Relay title to the League title won before the Easter break. For the Girls, the roles were reversed. An outstanding team performance saw the girls extend the lead throughout the race, winning comfortably to claim the Relay to the League title.

For the Intermediate teams (Yr 9 & 10), the Girls this time found themselves trailing and despite a truly valiant effort from Yvette Annis, the gap to close to Kings in first place was simply too much, so finishing in a creditable 2<sup>nd</sup> place, despite claiming the League title earlier in the year. For the boys, they were untouchable. The four exceptionally strong runners could not be matched over the four legs of the relay and finished some considerable distance ahead of their competitors, to add this to their League title too.

# THE ROAD TO WIMBLEDON TENNIS TOURNAMENT - Report by Miss Bowtell, PE

Two tournaments were held last week to discover who was the strongest Year 7-9 singles player to represent our School at the county stage of this national event.

On Thursday ten girls bravely entered the event with a variety of experiences. Some girls had been playing for several years and have joined local clubs as a result and for others it was their first competitive Tennis match ever. The boys matched the girls for numbers and experience levels and equally put on an excellent performance of quality play and superb sportsmanship.





Both boys and girls were divided into two leagues of five players with each player competing in a short match against everyone in their league. The top two players from each league then played in a semi final.

The first girls semi final was Alice Barratt vs Mary Pepper and this turned out to be an epic battle with the match ebbing from one sides advantage to the other but Mary narrowly won the match after a series of deuce games. The second girls match was a rerun of last year's singles final between Shisksha Kaur and Poppy McLearnen, a real battle between two School team players. Poppy played extremely well and despite all of Shiksha's best attempts and hardest drives simply played more consistently and made her way to her second final in two years. She was the reigning champion and wasn't going to let go of her title easily and this proved to be the case with endless rallies happening. One rally was over 30 shots in length and all at tremendous speed and requiring each girl to dash across the court. Poppy eventually wore her younger opponent down and once again was declared the Champion.

The boys' event was a story of the young pretender to the title Edward Mylchreest and the more experienced and calmer Saul Annis. Edward came through the first round of matches beating much older and more experienced opponents to the surprise of everyone, not least himself. He played a calm and sensible game and was relentless in his returns of other players shots. Edward didn't crack under the pressure at Deuces but simply kept on serving in a relaxed and calm manner and played the percentages game. Saul on the other hand played consistently well and demonstrated his greater experience around the court but also played with superb sportsmanship and was a fantastic role model to the new entrees to the event.

Despite beating Edward 2-1 in the early rounds they eventually met each other again in the finals. The other league was full of newcomers to the event and it was fantastic to see so many new faces to the event. Alf Larter was the "man mountain" whom others had to try to find a way around in this league and showed his experience from last year in reaching the semi-finals. However, he had to compete with Saul and Saul's extra power in his service made the difference in their match.

The other semi final was a fantastic surprise of Alex Allen against Edward Mylchreest which turned out to be a fantastic match. Just like the girls semi final of Alice vs Mary this turned out to be an epic match in the passion both boys displayed in wanting to get to their first final and playing shots they were both proud of and amazed at in equal numbers.

The final was between Edward and Saul and both boys were desperate to win and so the quality wasn't as good as in earlier rounds but this was to be expected with the title at stake. Both boys gave all of their best efforts and Edward narrowly outplayed Saul to become the first Year 7 to win this event.





The U13 boys first match is in 2 weeks time and we will be looking to select the team of five players based upon attendance at this tournament and at the Tennis clubs.
