CELEBRATING OUR YOUNG TRANSLATORS OF GERMAN – Report by Miss Raebel

Students of German across the year groups recently entered the prestigious Anthea Bell Prize for Young Translators. A competition run by Queen's College Translation Exchange at the University of Oxford. The competition celebrates the legacy of Anthea Bell OBE (1936–2018), one of the leading literary translators of the 20th and 21st centuries.

As a translator she brought classics texts ranging from Asterix to Franz Kafka to an English-speaking audience.
