

# BOURNE GRAMMAR SCHOOL BULLETIN

On Sunday Scott Merriman and Sophie Palmer, our Head Students, will lay a wreath at the Bourne War Memorial as part of the town's Act of Remembrance. I will walk in the procession with them and as I do every year at this time I find myself reflecting on the nature of sacrifice and the difficulty we have in helping young people understand the significance of Remembrance Day. Many are used to buying a Poppy but the extent to which they understand the deeper significance of the symbol is uncertain. We teach the First World War as part of our GCSE History course, and Key Stage 3 students certainly receive a grounding in the events of the Second World War, but it is difficult to empower our students in the classroom with an understanding of the individual sacrifice made by such large numbers of Service men and women. The best way perhaps of making the narrative of war and sacrifice relevant to our students is to relate it directly to the School they currently attend. Therefore I would ask any reader of this Bulletin who has knowledge or information about members of the Bourne Grammar School community who served in the First World War or any conflict since to get in touch. I would like to do more to trace the specifics of the School's history and further embed that history into our culture today.

A further understanding of the atmosphere and culture that surrounds the School was also at the heart of a decision to hold a Governors' Day this week, and I was delighted to welcome members of the Governing Body into our School to let them sample first hand what a morning at Bourne Grammar School is really like. They met students, watched lessons, spoke to staff and witnessed the hustle and bustle of break and lunchtime. This is part of a conscious decision to open up access to the School as much as possible to members of the community and the feedback from those Governors who spent the morning with us was as positive and enthusiastic as the feedback we continue to receive from families touring the School or those who attend events such as the Sixth Form Open Evening. There is a special atmosphere here, a purposeful positivity that penetrates much of what goes on and I look forward to welcoming prospective students, parents, Governors and anyone else who wishes to come and visit us in the future.

Finally, it has been another busy week of student activity. While our Year 11s work hard in their mock examinations we have had Year 10 Drama students attend an evening performance of "Blood Brothers" in Birmingham and cohorts of Year 10 Geographers travelled to Cambridge to conduct data collection fieldwork as part of their GCSE course. I watched some exciting netball fixtures with Peterborough School on Tuesday and was pleased to see the $1^{\text {st }} \mathrm{XV}$ take to the field at home against Spalding Grammar on Wednesday. Plans are afoot for a House Singing competition, the Art Department is gearing up for participation in a Rotary Club event and the Sixth Form Play is underway as a project. 31 Oxbridge candidates are currently engaging in interview practice, nearly 300 students have begun their targeted Covid catch-up programme and the annual Christmas Card Competition is imminent. On an individual level I would like to congratulate Rafe Wallbank in Year 13 who has been quietly producing artwork for the Dr Who Team at the BBC for their online platform. Another wonderful achievement for a Bourne Grammar School student. Good schools are always busy schools, and there is lots going on individually and collectively here!

GCSE GEOGRAPHY TRIP TO CAMBRIDGE - Mrs Greenfield, Subject Leader: Geography
It was another exciting week for the Geography department. Year 10 Geography classes have spent this week completing their Human Geography fieldwork in Cambridge. Sasha Milne has written the following report below on her experience of the field trip.

After the coach journey to Cambridge, we got off the coach and started the fieldwork promptly. We began by observing some houses down Storey's Way and doing a traffic and pedestrian count, as well as an environmental survey. We then walked a little further into the centre of Cambridge and did some more fieldwork at the locations: Fitzroy Street (Grafton Centre), Mill Road, King's Parade and Sidney Street. We did some work looking at the traffic, pedestrians and surveys of people around each area. Throughout the day we were reviewing the issues, sustainability and what is important about Cambridge, as well as asking the public on their opinions on Cambridge and why they were there. Whilst getting lots of varied responses, they were all very helpful and beneficial to help us understand and get to know Cambridge more. Thankfully, we had great weather. It was sunny for the most part which made the day go much better and smoother. Overall it was a great day and a great first GCSE field trip.

## ARKWRIGHT SCHOLARSHIP - Mr Delport, Subject Leader: Design Engineering

The Design Engineering Department would like to extend our congratulations to Elliot Plant for being awarded an Arkwright Scholarship.


An Arkwright Engineering Scholarship is the most prestigious scholarship of its type in the UK, established to inspire and nurture school-age students to be the Country's future leaders in Engineering. The Scholarships are awarded to high-calibre 16-yearold students through a rigorous selection process involving writing an aptitude test and then being invited for an interview to discuss their current GCSE projects at a designated university, his GCSE projects can be seen in the photo. Alexander will then be supported through the two years of his A-Levels.

Every Scholarship is sponsored by an industry partner, previous Bourne Grammar students have been sponsored by The Royal Airforce, GCHQ and Belfour Beatty, to mention a few. This Scholarship includes a financial incentive for students to support them with specific project needs or extended extra-curricular activities. This means that support is offered in various different ways, for example, valuable hands-on work experience, support for students' curriculum projects and access to a personal mentor working in industry who will support them with aspects of their studies and career planning.
