This week saw two more events that illustrate our commitment to wider educational experience. Firstly our GCSE PE students travelled to Skipton for a three day residential aimed at improving their practical skills. It was a huge success, illustrating once again the value of trips and activities in contributing to the personal development of our young people and thanks to the members of the PE department who organised this so effectively. Secondly we were treated to the latest BGS sessions 'concert in the Town Hall and this wonderful local venue once again provided the perfect backdrop for our young musicians to showcase their emerging talent and expertise. It was a thoroughly enjoyable evening, and the relationship with the Town Hall looks set to go from strength to strength.

In terms of individual achievement I mentioned in the last Bulletin our two Year 13 powerlifters who were set to compete in the national championships and am pleased to report that this week Georgina Harrison did more than just set a national record – in the under 58.5kg weight category and the T3 age category she managed a bench press of 75kg which set a world record in that class. In the deadlift competition she also managed a whopping 145kg deadlift which is a new national record in that class. It was also the largest deadlift in the 58.5kg weight class category regardless of age and experience: a phenomenal achievement. And with great pleasure I also wish to congratulate Rafe Wallbank on the successful accreditation process of his digital design work that has led to the publishing of his work by the global media distributor StudioCanal. Another impressive achievement by a Bourne Grammar student. YEAR 10 GCSE PE TRIP TO SKIPTON - Report by Year 10 students

Monday 28 March - Groups A & B - Climbing and Cycling (Poppy Bevan)

We had a very early morning as we had to be at School at 05:00 to get to Skipton in time to start the activities. After the 4 hour minibus journey, we arrived at Skipton at about 09:00, ready to start cycling and climbing. We got introduced to our groups - either A,B,C or D - and met our group leaders who were all very lovely and showed us the plan for the day. Groups A and B started off with rock climbing and started with either learning how to put on the harnesses and knots or bouldering (climbing without a harness) which was a lovely start to the morning as it got us used to our groups and eased us into our early morning. Groups C and D started off with road cycling which seemed like fun to start off with. Then after lunch these swapped around so groups A and B did cycling and groups C and D did climbing.



In the cycling part of the day we went through the roads near us, learned about ascending and descending down hills of differing slope degrees and got used to the cars passing us on the road. During all of these activities we were filmed and assessed to help them grade us for our GCSEs, which was a bit nerve wracking at first however we got used to it after a while. Finally we sat down to eat dinner, a homely classic of sausage and mash, followed by our evening activities which were climbing again for groups A and B in which we did a speed climb to assess us in our speed on the climbing wall. Groups C and D did cycling again, working on the indoor rollers.



Tuesday 29 March (Maddy Prince & Libby Moore)

Early in the morning, in good spirits, we rose to seize the day. Breakfast was served not long later (08:15) with a colourful variety of scrumptious choices catering for all needs. Groups A and B started the morning with rock climbing, consisting of learning how to belay and practicing our climbing techniques. In the afternoon, these groups were challenged when putting everything they were taught into action when completing more difficult courses. Groups C and D began the day with cycling around the beautiful scenery of Yorkshire in which they managed to perfect the art of ascending and descending hills. Later on after lunch time - nerves were running high when preparing for a race that could make or break our final GCSE grade in cycling.

After completing these activities, the groups reconnected for a well-prepared chicken korma curry. After a brief break, the groups split up once again to complete their evening activities (either speed climbing or rollers). Upon arrival to the centre, Groups A and B prepared to leave once again and travel to a nearby track after securing our bikes onto the trailer with assistance from our various instructors. We arrived at the track and we ate our pre-made sandwiches along with numerous sweet treats, ready for a jam-packed afternoon. We were greeted at the track with snow and rain but managed to complete our necessary skills of cornering, sprinting and group work successfully. We were now ready for the awaited 10 mile cycling race in which many were nervous, but with each other's support and encouragement, everyone finished the race relieved and glad of their abilities.
