Week ending Friday 6 May 2022 From Alastair Anderson, Headteacher

I would like to begin by congratulating our Year 7 and Year 8 students for their excellent attitude towards the assessments completed over the last two weeks. These provided a low stakes opportunity for our youngest students to showcase what they can do and the process has been completed very smoothly indeed. I hope the students gained valuable experience of sitting papers in a formal setting and that they are all able to identify at least one area of learning that they can target for improvement as a consequence. Successfully developing good examination technique requires a great deal of purposeful practice like this.

It is always pleasing to find evidence of happy students involved in high quality learning and therefore, it was a real pleasure to receive a report this week from Mayra Narang in Year 9 describing a science practical that she had been involved in recently. Mayra was not asked to write this report and we would not usually expect students to voluntarily write about their excitement at a lesson: but as Mayra chose to do so I have decided to share her thoughts with you all. She wrote:

"Hearing Mr Vaughan say we were going to be dissecting a heart made me feel quite excited, as I had been told about these investigations by students in the year above, and felt quite jealous of them. The dissection itself was quite an experience with some individuals dissecting with...enthusiasm. We also got to wear lab coats, which made it even better – safety aside they made us feel like 'proper' scientists. Mr Vaughan carefully instructed us on how to take apart the heart, and we got to see the structures we had been learning about on paper in 3D; the 4 chambers of the heart, the thicker left ventricle and valves. It was an interesting reminder to me that science isn't just stats or a bunch of content in a GCSE Biology textbook – it's about applying what you know, and our work right now might have real life applications one day."

This represents a very reflective approach to learning, and shows the value of carefully planned practical work. I have to confess that my own school career as a student never featured such opportunities; the fact that young students at Bourne Grammar are given these kinds of challenges, in turn prompting an unsolicited written reflection, is wonderful and a perfect illustration of the high quality culture embedded here.

Finally, this week saw the first major athletics' meet of the summer season and Bourne Grammar continues to experience significant success in Track and Field. 70 students from Years 7-11 attended the South Lincolnshire event, offering the opportunity to qualify for the County Championships on Thursday 9 June and ultimately represent Lincolnshire at the English Schools Championships in July. A number of our athletes performed at an excellent standard and we had a significant number of winners across all events. Notable performances included Lawson Capes in the shot (13.77m), Max Roe in the 100m Hurdles (13.9s) and long Jump (6.26m), Faith Perkins in the 800m, Evie Griffin in the High Jump (1.43m), Charlotte Smith and Gailie Tsang in the Long Jump (4.70m and 4.60m respectively), Pearl Ford in the 100m, hurdles and long jump, Alex Watson in the 200m, Niamh Glasswell in the 300m and Aoife Glasswell in both the 300m and 800m. It is anticipated that around 50 of our 70 competitors will be selected to attend the next stage of the competition. Well done to all who put themselves forward and represented the School so impressively.



YEAR 12 TRIP TO KELHAM ISLAND, SHEFFIELD - Wednesday 27 April 2022 - Report by Miss Pollard, Teacher of Geography

On Wednesday 28 April, we took thirty Year 12 Geography students to Kelham Island in Sheffield as part of their A Level studies about changing places. I'd like to say well done and thank you to all of the students who attended - their behaviour was impeccable and the fieldwork experience will be invaluable when they embark on their Independent Investigations later this year. Saanchi Chetal and Beth Ashley have written a report on the day:

On our trip to Sheffield we arrived at 10am and started by going to the Kelham Island Museum, where we were able to explore and learn about the industrial past of the city, seeing examples of the kind of labour and machinery that was used in steel manufacturing and other industries.

We then began our 45-minute walk around Kelham Island and went down Mowbray Street and Little Kelham to see how much the area has changed since the Industrial Revolution. Next, we were able to carry out our data collection tasks such as: conducting questionnaires to ask local residents what change they've witnessed in the area, as well as their outlook on these changes, doing environmental surveys and taking pictures of buildings to then write about how they portray the development over time.



For lunch we were able to choose where we ate, many of the cafes and restaurants having been converted from old factory and production buildings; one of these being Cutlery Works. Lastly, we met everyone back at the museum to end our day by watching 'The River Don Engine' which is the largest working steam engine in Europe.

Overall, we all had a great day and it was wonderful to be able to get out and about after COVID-19 restrictions. CAREERS TALKS - Mrs Elliot UCAS and Careers Coordinator


