## The Knife of Never Letting Go by Patrick Ness - Review by Courtney Pudney, Year 10.

This book is a dystopian thriller of approximately 490-500 pages. It is written in the perspective of a young boy called Todd Hewitt who is the only boy in a village of 'adult' men. They live on a planet called 'New World' after leaving their previous planet ('Old World'). What makes Todd's life so interesting is that in the New World, everyone's thoughts are of audible expression called 'Noise'. Therefore, no one has privacy and secrets cannot exist. However, that does not stop lies breaching a concept that is seemingly unbreakable. As Todd grows more curious and desperate to learn the truth, he soon realises that not everything is quite as simple as it seems. This book explores his journey to find the lies whilst meeting many new characters who will help him along the way. This book is exciting and action packed whilst demonstrating an intriguing variety of techniques, such as the fonts used for Noise and the vocabulary and spelling adapted to appropriately fit the lifestyle and history of Todd. The Knife of Never Letting Go is the first book of the 'Chaos Walking' series. Despite learning so much of this unique world in this book, there is a lot more to be explored in the sequel. I really enjoyed reading this and I would recommend it to anyone looking for a mysterious and lively fiction story.

#### 'UNLEASH YOUR DRIVE' GOLF CLUB - Report by Mr Graves, PE Teacher

This Wednesday saw the exciting launch of a new project. 'Unleash Your Drive' is a programme devised in collaboration with Mindset experts Yeast Ltd and a group of PGA Professionals, that teaches techniques such as breathing and visualisation alongside traditional golf skills to improve a person's 'Mental Toughness.'

Mental Toughness includes <u>Confidence, Commitment, Challenge and Control.</u> Hopefully the techniques the students learn in their golf lessons will help them to better address challenges in everyday life; at School, in exams and at home.

The very first thing the students did was complete a standard Mental Toughness test (MTQ48) which measures how people respond when faced with stressors, pressure and challenge. The techniques that I will share with students (through golf games/challenges) will hopefully show an improvement in these by the end of the programme when pupils will complete the questionnaire again.

The first session went really well (the sun being out certainly helped!). We looked at developing self-confidence by focusing on the things that we they did really well, as opposed to the things that didn't quite go to plan, as our tendency is to focus on the negatives.

Next week we are going to work on our 'Square of Concentration' - This is an imaginary square that a player places around them to help them solely on the task in hand and eliminate all eternal distractions.

Also, the students that take part in the programme have very kindly been invited to have a round of golf at Burghley Park Golf Club in Stamford by Darren Game (PGA Golf Coach and Junior Lead). There will be no cost to the pupils for this. I very much look forward to seeing the skills (both golf and mental) out on a proper course.
