Accessing results going back as far as I am able these look to be the best A-Level results sat *via* examinations that the school has seen so far.

Statistically 76% of all grades are at B or above, 48% at A or above and an impressive 70 students have achieved A* or A grades in all subjects. The overall pass rate is 99.9%. The average UCAS points score per subject per student is 43 (for context a B grade is worth 40 and an A grade 48), a fantastic achievement for all concerned. Most notably there is a sharp increase in the number of A and A* grades compared to 2019, the last time formal examinations were sat. Back then 7.5% of grades achieved were at A* and 20.7% at A.

In 2022 these numbers are 20.6% and 26.7% respectively representing a 67% increase in the number of top A and A* grades achieved by BGS
