

### BOURNE GRAMMAR SCHOOL BULLETIN

Week ending Friday 5 February 2021 From Alastair Anderson, Headteacher

Two topics have dominated conversations in school this week: the mental health of everyone within the School community and the strategy behind the awarding of GCSE and A-Level grades to Year 11 and Year 13 students this year. Both are, of course, linked and I have been very aware of the growing pressure on our hard working public examinations' cohorts in the context of uncertain return dates, the government consultation report due at the end of February and the everyday strain of constant on-screen learning. I am writing separately today to all students in Years 11 and 13 to give them as much information as possible regarding the next few weeks and months, and I hope the letter will calm a few nerves and help provide some clarity at this difficult time. As a school we are acutely aware that our planning based on assumptions regarding the date of reopening and what will come from the consultation document is all subject to change, but I have done my best to lay out a simple optimistic message for them all with as much detail provided as I dare. And a simple optimistic message is vital for us all to hold on to. Lockdown is reducing the infection rates, the speed of the vaccination programme is quicker than many of us thought it would be, and Spring is not too far away. The only way is up....and for all students in all year groups brighter times are on the horizon.

Mental Health has become a focus for many in the last twelve months, and the language around Wellbeing is everywhere to be heard. I am pleased to be able to tell you that my personal career journey has featured a significant Wellbeing development element to it, and it is our intention to grow the quality and provision for all students in the months and years to come as we look to equip our youngsters with the tools to thrive in an ever more complex world. I am delighted that we have taken our first small steps forward in this area with a large number of staff undertaking their Mental Health First Aid qualifications and 27 staff volunteers have come forward to register their interest with Mr Brunker in developing Wellbeing within the School. This is only the start of a process that will take time to nurture and grow, but it is the long term ambition to put together a programme that will do more than just provide effective triage for those in need: we must find ways of developing the strength, resilience and understanding in our young people that will allow them to shrug off challenges in their present and future lives. It will be an exciting journey ahead, full of logistical challenge I am sure, but a very important and worthwhile project to embark upon.

Finally I want to thank the Head Students for meeting with me weekly on a Wednesday morning. Their smiles and stories along with their hopes and fears have helped reconnect me with the profession I love. Talking to a screen and teaching lessons to groups who are simply voices and texts has been hard for teachers as well as learners, and having the opportunity to engage in a more effective online conference call with our Head Students has been a real highlight. Taking time to see and remember what education is all about – the students, their journeys and their outcomes – has helped maintain my own sense of optimism this week and helped me remember why, when times are so tough and uncertain, working in education is such a privilege.



#### CAREERS AND UCAS UPDATE - Mrs Hawkins, Careers, UCAS and Examinations Officer

Things are very busy in the Careers and UCAS Department at the moment across several year groups and I thought that parents might like a snapshot of what is going on.

In Year 9 thoughts are turning to GCSE subject choices ahead of the virtual Options Evening next week on 9 February. In order to help our students prepare, they are working through tutor-led tasks set through Unifrog and we strongly encourage you to use the platform with them to look at how choices made now may influence and affect future study and career choices. I will be available on the evening for Q&A sessions, so please do ask if you need any help.

In Year 11, 1-1 careers and options meetings are underway via the TEAMS platform. Students were given the opportunity to request a meeting with me in December and I have already had many very interesting conversations with students about Post-16 study options, university choices and future careers. If you feel that your son/daughter would benefit from a meeting with me then please encourage them to contact me via email and I will set a meeting up with them. Year 11 have also received information on myriad virtual work experience opportunities and how to find and apply for these. Although it is a little early in the year for students to be focusing on work experience, some opportunities are taking place later on and can be applied for now.

In Year 12 we launched our UCAS support programme this week with a live and interactive talk from the University of Nottingham. Our contact, Will Hollis, spoke excellently and engagingly, introducing UCAS and how to start researching universities and courses. The presentation was attended by 200 of our Year 12 students, which was really fantastic to see. We also had some excellent questions! The presentation slides are available to students through the Year 12 TEAMS channel.

Also in Year 12, Christ's College Cambridge ran a webinar on applying to Oxbridge to our potential applicants last week. This webinar covered preparing to make a competitive application, super-curricular activities, wider-reading, courses available and how to include all of your hard work in your personal statement. Hopefully this will have given the students plenty to be thinking about over the coming months.

Students in Year 12 have been receiving information from me over the last couple of weeks about a range of additional opportunities such as the PWC Flying Start Degree Programmes, PWC's summer school, how to search for and apply to virtual work experience opportunities, how to attend the UK Universities and Apprenticeship Fair and the University of Nottingham Summer School.

Next week is National Apprenticeship Week and on Tuesday morning we have a speaker making a live presentation from the National Apprenticeship Service. They will be giving our Year 12s an overview of apprenticeships and will then go on to run an employability workshop - relevant to all students in Year 12, regardless of their future plans. This will be a first for us over the TEAMS platform, so we are hoping that it is a success and that the students take away some excellent tips.

The first Tuesday back after half term we have A Star Future talking over TEAMS to Year 12 about applying to study abroad - this is usually a very engaging talk and will be particularly interesting this year with the changes anticipated due to Brexit.

In Year 13, the on-time UCAS application deadline was last Friday and this year was a bumper year for applications, with 194 applications submitted. Student Finance England will shortly be opening for applications for entry 2021 and the students will all receive information about this in due course. 
I haven't planned anything for the summer yet but I'm really hoping lockdown will end soon and I can look forward to spending time outside in the warm weather and hopefully see my friends again.

#### HOUSE POINT TOTALS




These totals show all House Points earned minus Behaviour Points. It includes points from all students in each house up to 05/02/2021.
