There has been a great feeling around School this week: the sun has been shining, there are more students in lessons rather than in exam rooms, and a distinct sense of normality has been evident as the term has begun. I have widened my morning walks, taking in all 3 gates and engaging with students of all ages, and I have been struck by the optimism and the smiles that have been evident on so many faces as our students arrive at School. It has been a significant boost to the morale of everyone in the community to be able to focus on high quality holistic education again. Long may this last!

I hope many parents who drop their children off in the morning have noted the changes we have made to the staffing of the entrance and exit gates to the School site. I was a little concerned towards the end of last term by the volume of traffic through these gates, the rather haphazard method of drop off and the number of car horns being sounded out on the main road as congestion built next to the School entrance. By placing a member of our Site Team on each gate, and encouraging all drivers not to stop close to the School entrance, we have much improved traffic flow and now have significantly less congestion on the road. Please can I ask that all parents continue to work with the Site Team to avoid blocking the entrance, and also work with all of us to make sure pupils are as safe as possible as they walk through the gates and into School. Please drive slowly when moving from entrance to exit, and follow the guidance of the Site Team.

Finally I would briefly like to reflect on the passing of the Duke of Edinburgh and the legacy that his Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme and overall attitude towards education has provided young people. The Duke, who came to Bourne Grammar in April 2013 to open the Turing Centre, was educated at Gordonstoun and the educational ethos there is grounded on the founding principles of the school's founder Kurt Hahn. Hahn was a product of the early 20th Century and unsurprisingly his views therefore, do not chime with everything we believe today. However, he famously wrote this:

"I regard it as the foremost task of education to ensure the survival of these qualities: an enterprising curiosity, an undefeatable spirit, tenacity in pursuit, readiness for sensible self-denial, and above all, compassion."

It would be a brave educationalist to argue that any of these qualities have become redundant, and in the difficult times we are emerging from at the moment they seem particularly apt. The challenge for 21st century schools is to continue to develop them in a context where examination results are our bread and butter and the focus on examination results often takes away from the available time and opportunity to maintain a holistic and curious educational perspective. I see this as our most fundamental challenge in the years ahead: to ensure the happy coexistence of academic ambition, pastoral support and personal development – surely the three pillars of any high quality education. To be curious, resilient, tenacious, unselfish and compassionate are personal development characteristics the Duke of Edinburgh therefore actively encouraged, and I hope our Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award teams training this weekend enjoy whatever challenges are presented to them and use these to make positive steps forward in developing these same characteristics. Schools must always prioritise academic progress, but the Duke of Edinburgh's life and legacy helps us understand that success and happiness is grounded in so much more than can be provided within the four walls of a classroom environment.



KS3 EXPLORE BOOK CLUB - Report by Dr Barmby

During Term 3, students in Key Stage 3 had the opportunity to participate in an online session led by undergraduate students and an archivist from the University of Oxford. The focus of our first session was Tolkien's *The Hobbit* and students read the first chapter in preparation for the meeting. Students were then invited to reflect on the book and submit a book review to the University. I am delighted to report that Livvy Bodmer (Year 7) took up the challenge and her review was selected as a winning entry.

Congratulations to Livvy, who won a 50th anniversary edition of *The Lord of the Rings*. A copy of Livvy's winning review can be read below.

Bilbo Baggins is a peaceful hobbit, spending most of his time in his cosy hobbit hole, until Gandalf, Thorin and his dwarf friends whizz him off on an exciting adventure full of twists and turns. I have only read up to chapter 5 but I would like to share my thoughts on the book so far.

All the characters have different personalities, Bilbo being kind and shy and Gandalf being confident and slightly bossy are only naming a few. This is especially impressive as there are so many dwarfs who are similar yet so different at the same time. I recently found out that the colour of the dwarfs hoods had a meaning and this level of detail is very interesting as it gives every dwarf an individual personality in the story.

The book painted a vivid image in my head and I could imagine the characters and the setting so clearly in my mind as the way Tolkien described everything was in so much detail throughout all the chapters I have read, and there was a vast range of adjectives throughout, I was never bored.

Even in those first few chapters, I never knew what was going to happen next, especially when Bilbo and his crew got captured by trolls, that has been my favourite part so far as when I was reading that part, I could not put the book down. The first chapter was so intriguing, as it told me all I needed to know about Bilbo's life and it made me long to read more. That first chapter also made me laugh when all the dwarfs barged into Bilbo's hobbit hole and Bilbo had no clue what was going on!

I have really enjoyed this book, but I think that Gandalf could have been a bit more likeable, that would make this book even better than it already is. I think that that's the only thing I can fault about this book, proving that it's an amazing novel, even today.

I would definitely recommend this book to anyone 10+ as it can be a bit wordy for the younger readers and to anyone who loves adventure and fantasy like I do. I rate this book a 9/10 and I can't wait to read more.
