My Bulletin last week produced a reaction from the student body, and I am pleased to see that we have strong views within School with students prepared to challenge appropriately what I say and do. The point made to me was that Margaret Thatcher's record as Prime Minister is such a controversial one, particularly in the realm of equality, that perhaps it isn't appropriate to hold her up as an example of someone to admire. My reply to this was that last week's article did not hold her up as a role model as such but instead illustrated that, as a woman in the UK in the late 1970s, a successful journey from humble Lincolnshire beginnings to national leader *via* a training in science was worthy of attention, regardless of our take on her policies and politics. A good debate, and hats off to those in Year 13 who felt strongly enough to state their opinion.

The discussion around this led me to consider the subject of female role models at a time when equality is such a significant topic in society from a multitude of angles, not just from the perspective of gender. We have a duty in School to promote equality: it is enshrined in the British Values that we promote, and when we consider the impact of the pandemic on women it sharpens the focus further. The EU commission has reported that women have disproportionately born the burden of front line health care in the last year, at the same time experienced a sharp rise in domestic violence and have been disproportionately affected in the labour market as retail and hospitality have struggled. Now more than ever we need good role models for girls in school.

If Thatcher's rise to power is a case study in dynamic leadership perhaps we might look at Jacinda Ardern as a case study in the successful delivery of 21st century progressive politics. As New Zealand's Prime Minister, Ardern is a committed social democrat, a champion of women's rights, and is unafraid to question political orthodoxy. Prepared to challenge the Chinese government over human rights abuses, willing to criticise Australia's deportation policy, a supporter of same-sex marriage and a pride parade marcher, Ardern represents the reawakening of an approach that prioritises social equality grounded in an "ethos of kindness", and whether we agree or not with the specifics of her policy platform we must acknowledge the impact she is having on the world stage. She brought her 3 month old baby into the UN General Assembly in 2018, she publicly wore the hijab as she comforted New Zealand's Muslims after the Christchurch massacre and in 2020 a landslide victory in New Zealand's General Election demonstrated that a politician steeped in humanity and empathy could grab the attention of the electorate.

So...to the students in Year 13 who expressed their views so eloquently to me last week I hope this Bulletin serves to provide balance. As a historian I find Thatcher's career every bit as interesting as Ardern's growing profile: different people living in different contexts, different political platforms and different impacts but with one thing in common. Both demonstrate that women can thrive on the global political stage and be successful leaders in their own right. At Bourne Grammar we will develop our commitment to equality in the months and years ahead, and we will ensure that all members of our School play an equal role in the development of our community and its goals. In doing this, role models such as Ardern have a crucial role to play.


