As we approach the end of term, many departments are carrying out assessments. These are an important part of School life to ensure the best academic progress for our students. These assessments can occupy a great deal of head space for our students, and a great many conversations have been had around the importance students place on these assessments. I have reflected at length on what is behind this, be it the impact of having an 11+ process for enrolling at Bourne Grammar School, or the environment that comes with academically competitive students in a selective school. I am proud of our students for wanting to do their best and we as staff work hard to help each and every one of our students reach their potential.

It is important to remember that these ongoing internal assessments are opportunities to identify where and how students are progressing, where attention can be directed for improvement, and to provide important guidance on how to best support and encourage our students. They are not definitive in the way that public GCSE and A-Level examinations are, and I encourage all of our students to try and remember this to relieve the extreme stress that can often emerge around these assessments.

I know that some students will not have done as well as they might have hoped, and I want us all to nurture a culture where this disappointment is embraced as a normal aspect of development, where hard work is rewarded whatever the outcome, and where wellbeing is prioritised and promoted through a culture of relentless positivity. Let us all own these values, so the School's ethos, grounded in "best atmosphere" and "best support", can shine.

GCSE GEOGRAPHY SICILY TRIP - Mrs Greenfield, Subject Leader of Geography

This year's trip was a wonderful opportunity for the Year 11 students to develop their knowledge and understanding of both Physical and Human Geography through hands-on experience in Sicily. During the week, our young Geographer's studied volcanology first-hand on Mount Etna, Europe's highest and most active stratovolcano. Additionally, they explored the effects of lava flow at the Alcantara Gorge, visited the volcanic island of Vulcano in the Aeolian Islands, and also studied the effects of

tourism on the Sicilian coast. It was a week packed with fabulous educational insights and some unforgettable experiences. Below, several students describe our week in more detail.

Day 1: Trip to Sicily by Matilda Hulme

We all arrived at school for a very early start on Monday morning at 00:20, and we were greeted by the tired yet enthusiastic teachers. As everyone arrived, we staggeringly found our seats on the coach and got ready for the 3-hour long journey down to Gatwick airport. A lot of people caught up on some lost hours of sleep whilst others talked excitedly of what was to come within the next week, most of us kept awake with excitement. We arrived at the airport and checked in the luggage and then we were given our numbers which I think a lot of the teachers (especially Mr Murray came to resent by the end of the week!). After an hour and a half of duty-free shopping it was time to board and we landed at Catania airport at around 10:30am, where we could already see Mt. Etna from the runway. Once we had collected the luggage and all got onto the bus we drove to the small town of Giardini Naxos for some lunch and then a tour of the archaeological site. Later, after our exploration of the site, we set off for our hotel on the Letojanni seafront and checked into our rooms, had dinner and then got some well-earned sleep for the next day!

Day 2: Mount Etna by Florence Dexter

After waking up at six in the morning to a beautiful sunrise over the glowing sea, we walked through the charming seaside town of Letojanni to the coach, so that we could embark on our day to climb Mount Etna. Before arriving at the active stratovolcano, we stopped at a place where we could see the path that the lava had taken during the extremely destructive eruption between 1986 and 1987. It lasted over 400 days and destroyed acres of farmland and completely obliterated many villages.

Once we had visited this historic site, we continued our journey to Mount Etna that was now towering over us. Not long after, we reached the main tourist area where there were several lovely souvenir shops and restaurants with a view of the volcano and the rest of Sicily. We continued our incline by going in the creaking cable cars, which had spectacular views in every direction.

These took us up to about 2500m above sea level. At this point, we piled into multiple white trucks that took us further up the volcano along the very bendy tracks. From here, we walked with our tour guides around the edges of a few craters until we got to a point where we could very clearly see the peak of the volcano. The sky was so clear that we could see all around us and fortunately, we could also see the constant stream of smoke coming out of it, with the occasional O-shaped cloud ring emerging from the crater.



The views of the Mediterranean Sea, Sicily and Etna were amazing from where we were standing, given that we were now almost 3000m above sea level. Lucky for us, this was the highest point of the volcano that the teachers had ever been able to reach on this trip, so it was even more exciting for everyone. Once many pictures were taken and volcanic rock samples were put in our sealable bags, we returned back to the main tourist area of the volcano, on the trundling trucks and the creaking cable cars.

We then had some free time to buy some lunch and souvenirs. My friends and I went to a restaurant where we shared a pizza with chips and Frankfurter sausages on top, which was surprisingly tasty, and we bought lots of lava rocks and jewellery from the shops. After the tiring but tremendous day climbing up Mount Etna, we headed back to the hotel. Unfortunately, we had no time to go for a swim in the warm sea, so we had some dinner at the hotel and then went into the main square where we all bought some delicious gelato. To end our amazing day, we went to the roof terrace where we played UNO and other fun card games to help us relax and recall our exciting day with our peers. Climbing up the famous volcano ensured that we all made so many wonderful memories, and I am certain that climbing up Mount Etna will be a day that none of us will ever forget.

Day 3: Vulcano Island trip by Kris Rushworth

It was an early start as we drove down to the port where we caught a hydrofoil for a 40minute trip to the island of Vulcano.

After meeting our guide, we headed up to the foot of the mountain where we began our trek up to the summit, some 500m above sea level. Although it was still early, the temperature began to climb to the mid-20s. The surface had a scree like slope created by past eruptions and it was slipping away under foot, making the ascent tough. As we began to see the top, the smell of sulphur assaulted our noses as it emerged from cracks in the rocks. With Mr Murray leading the group in his flip flops we reached the top after about an hour of climbing.

A faster descent followed and after emptying our shoes of rocks we headed back to the port for a boat tour. We were shown all the islands created by volcanic activity.

On arriving back in the port, we headed to the Black Sands beach – aptly named where we had lunch and there was opportunity to swim and relax. It was then back to the hydrofoil for the return journey followed by an evening where we were allowed time to ourselves.



Day 4: Taormina by Emma Dennis

On Thursday, we had breakfast at 8 am, and were on the coach at 8:30, heading for the Ancient Greek theatre in Taormina. We spent around an hour looking around, including a fantastic explanation of the history of the theatre from Mr Moxley. From the highest seats you could see out to Mount Etna, and a view of the whole of the coastline we were staying by.

Once we had thoroughly explored and taken in the scenery at the theatre, we moved back down into

Taormina centre for souvenir shopping and local cuisine. There was an entire street dedicated to tourist shops, and my group spent a while picking out various bracelets and fridge magnets. The food was delicious - especially the arancini, which originates in Sicily.

After a very crowded bus ride back to the coach, we drove to the Alcantara gorge and changed into our aqua shoes. Here we spent an hour wading through the water, and the scenery in the gorge was phenomenal. Some people decided to have a proper dunk, and float a bit down the river. Later, we got on the coach to go back to Letojanni (where the hotel was) and spent the next few hours swimming in the sea and relaxing on the beach or in our rooms. Me and my friends loved to play UNO on the terrace just before dinner. This day was definitely the highlight of my trip.

Day 5: Return to England by Matilda Hulme

The Friday morning was the day of 'Swimming club' which was a beautiful morning swim in the sea watching the sunrise with Mr Moxley and Mr Murray. Most chose the option to lie in a bit that morning but about a dozen students had the early 6:30 start to swim or enjoy a final few card games on the terrace. We had a final breakfast and then had packing time before we had to say goodbye to the amazing views and lovely hotel and head off to the airport. After spending 2 hours in the airport McDonald's playing cards and chatting, we checked in and explored duty free for a while - getting some final (very expensive) souvenirs - before getting ready to board the plane. Once we had boarded, we were then sat there for a two-hour delay! Which involved a quite a bit off clapping, cheering more card games and snacking! Finally, we reached UK soil again and did our number calls for the final time once we'd got through boarder control. The three-hour coach ride home flew by and before we knew it we were back at school and reunited with family and saying goodbye to new friends and amazing memories.

Everyone who attended the trip is extremely grateful for the experiences and the memories we've all made and want to thank all the teachers who made this trip possible, it was a truly incredible experience and a wonderful opportunity to put to life what we'd been learning in the classroom. YEAR 12 AND 13 VISIT TO LONDON GALLERIES, FRIDAY 6 OCTOBER - Report by Scarlet Clifford, Elspeth Dunk, Maddy Partridge and Emma Smith, Year 12

On our A-level Art trip we were fortunate to visit four exhibitions, in four galleries, in order to gain inspiration for our Fine Art coursework.



After arriving in London, we headed straight to the Tate Modern to see Capturing the Moment which focused on the relationship between contemporary paintings and photography. One of the first pieces we noticed was The Weeping Woman by Pablo Picasso, this was particularly interesting due to studying this painting in Year 8. We especially enjoyed Francis Bacon's paintings of disfigured faces as it helped develop ideas relating to distortion for our own themes. Seeing the range of images which were on display, showing movement through blurred sections and long exposure shots, gave us inspiration for our own photography.

Travelling by Uber boat to the Tate Britain was an exciting way to view many of the famous landmarks in London. Within the gallery we saw "Happy Gas," the Sarah Lucas exhibition; a shocking display of sculpture and installation. However, we noticed how she challenges ideas of gender and demonstrates a real, unfiltered representation of what it's like to be human.

The third gallery we visited was The Courtauld Gallery. Through the exhibition 'Claudette Johnson: Presence' it was important to see her pieces in the gallery amongst work which centred around male artists from the Renaissance and Impressionist period.

This stark contrast in topic, style, technique and material provided us with insight into a world where social politics and art collide and also, the importance of seeing work from a female artist in such a traditional setting. The pieces were highly impactful as her decision to use different mediums highlighted the importance of diversity in art. Many of us left the exhibition feeling inspired with ideas, the confidence to experiment with different materials and an awareness of the impact that large scale drawings can have, as they become more common at A-Level.





To conclude our trip, we visited The National Gallery to see the Franz Hals exhibition. This was an incredible opportunity to see so much of his work for the first time outside of Amsterdam in many years. The grand nature of his work was complemented by the impressive architecture of the gallery itself. Currently in Year 12 we are studying the human form and still life, consequently, Hals work served us well to provide an excellent example of realism and accuracy. We all thoroughly enjoyed the day and learnt so much from seeing such a broad variety of Art. We would like to thank Mrs Welling for arranging the trip and Miss Wright for supporting us on the day.

PSHE Events – Report by David Williamson-Ward, PSHE Coordinator

As well as an exciting new-look PSHE programme launching during term one, we've also had the pleasure of welcoming two external teams into School to work with some of our students. First up, on 20 September we welcomed Lincolnshire County Council's Stay Safe team back and they spent a jam-packed day working with our Year 7s. They covered a wide range of topics including: road safety, staying safe online, how to make and maintain healthy relationships, anti-social behaviour and drug and alcohol awareness. Many of these important topics are areas that our students will learn much more about during their Personal Development journey at Bourne Grammar School and these sessions served as an ideal way to frame them with a secondary school perspective. The team went away praising our students and were delighted with the way in which students discussed and questioned their own understanding of these important topics.

On 28 September, The Conversation (Stamford) worked with our Year 11 students and focused on 'Body Positivity'. This workshop explored how and why many of us struggle with our body image and the influence of social media and marketing. Students discussed and debated how this can impact thoughts and behaviour and they finished by exploring strategies for managing feelings associated with their body image. The team felt that students dealt with this subject maturely and they left them with a helpful pack with sources for further support and top tips for managing their body positivity.

Both days were very successful and we are so proud of how well all of our students engaged with the programme. In term two, it's the turn of our Year 8 students and their November workshop will focus on 'Cyberwisdom'.

ETON CHESS TOURNAMENT – Report by Mr Farrow

On Sunday 1 October the school's A and B chess teams competed in the Eton rapid play tournament at Eton college. In this competition students had the opportunity to compete against some of the best young players across England (and one school in Ireland). 56 teams entered the Eton rapid play tournament, with a combined 377 players entered in the event.

Whilst the teams overall were unfortunate to only finish 43rd and 48th out of the 56 teams there were a few standout performances from a couple of individuals, Shaan Damani of the B team going undefeated with a score of 4.5/5 and finishing 21st overall and Gabriel Carver of the A team scoring an impressive 4/5 and finishing 48th.
