BGS CHILDREN IN NEED FUNDRAISER – Report by Sumehra Rowza and Rhea Joshi, on behalf of the Equality and Diversity Committee, Year 13

For our first major event as the Year 13 Equality and Diversity Committee, it is safe to say that the Children in Need fundraiser was an incredible success.

We began by researching the resources required for the fundraiser to take place, such as prizes, cake decorations, and of course the merchandise itself. Once our idea got approval from Ms Creedon, we set to work on filling out paperwork and determining appropriate pricing with the student body in mind. To do this, we developed a spreadsheet to project profit margins - using it to simulate possible sale prices for each item - and compiled it into one place for ease of access when making the orders. As a team, we made the decision to be ambitious with our projections and created an original profit goal of £300.

Next on our agenda was to ascertain the logistics of the week. The raffle turned out to be a surprisingly complex aspect since there is such a large student population. We detailed a raffle selling system to ensure that we, the organisers, would have a secure way of identifying each ticket to its holder with optimal speed. We also began to organise the bake sale and enlisted the help of some generous Year 13s: Nandhitha Guhan, Catie Dawson, Megan Smith - thank you for your wonderful bakes.



With only 2 weeks left, it was time to start our preparations. Promotional slides were put in Student Notices and posters were placed around School. By releasing the adverts a week in advance, we steadily generated excitement in anticipation for the event. Since our event was so large-scale, for it to be successful we required a big team of helpers. Luckily for us, our dedicated prefect community and Head Students were more than willing to take part.

Due to this, we were able to visit multiple forms during form time every day: selling raffle tickets, Pudsey ears and pins, and clarifying queries about the week.



Friday was the most pivotal day of our event - Children in Need Day. To begin the day, students completed a Children in Need themed Friday Quiz during form time. As it was the last day of form selling, we were so happy to see that we had completely sold out of all Pudsey Ears and pin badges.

In preparation for the bake sale, the E&D Committee carefully decorated each cupcake in time for lunch and arranged them in the Maths Foyer with the help

of our trusty volunteers. As soon as the bell rang, the crowd was instant. Within 15 minutes we had completely sold out

of all cupcakes and baked goods and then set to work on helping those on raffle duty instead. Yet within another 10 minutes we soon found ourselves selling the very last ticket of the backup raffle supply we kept on hand, marking a total of 1,800 sold tickets. Soon after, the raffle draw began and we invited a few lucky students wearing their Pudsey ears to draw the three winning names. We were delighted to see such a large turn out and great community spirit.



Due to the generosity of the student body and staff here at BGS, we collectively managed to raise £835.16!





Everyone's contributions have been impactful and beyond our expectations – resulting in well over twice our initial projections. All of the profits will be going to charity. Additionally, we chose to source the majority of our resources from the official BBC Children in Need store to ensure that those funds too could be donated towards the cause.

Big congratulations to Matilda Knowles (7D), Saihaan Damani (8A) and Jack Morrison (13H) on winning the raffle. Lastly, a huge thank

On Monday, the U16 Netball team travelled the 1.5 hours to Nottingham to play in the 2nd round of the national Sisters 'n' Sport competition. We arrived to some fantastic facilities, and after a very quick warm-up the match began, and what a match it was!

The first quarter was a tight affair and started very well for us, as we turned over their first centre to go 2-0 up. Our defensive play was phenomenal, forcing four held balls in this period with Emma Dennis and Tula Harvey doing a fantastic job of making the GA and GS work to get in the D. We were playing 15 minute quarters (which is unusual at school level) and so tiredness crept in for the last 90 seconds which allowed NHS to open up a four goal lead on us at 10-6.

After a quick pep talk, the girls were back out with Bella Burton, Lucy Taylor and Annie Hayes coming on as fresh legs. Our aim was to get in front of our players more and avoid rushing on the turn overs. The team responded to this brilliantly however, the opposition's GA (who has recently been spotted by Loughborough Lightening) was having an incredible game scoring shots wherever she took them in the D. This meant we went into half-time 18-13 down but we still very much in it as we created a number of chances that just didn't quite sink.

We came out fighting in the third quarter, Poppy Fasulo securing an early intercept to turn over one of their centres. Annie Hayes was moved to GA to give Evie Griffin a rest after a phenomenal first half against their best player and captain GD. Annie hasn't taken a netball shot for a few months but kept her cool to score on her first attempt. Our defence continued to be impressive with Millie Herrick being outstanding – I have never seen a player keep another Centre so out of the game and she was also instrumental in our attacking play (and was deservedly voted Player of the Match by the opposition at the end). We won the third quarter 6-5 and were really starting to build our momentum.

The fourth and final quarter was a tense affair. Our defence had worked so hard throughout the game and continued to dominate with Emma, Tula and Lucy making a few important intercepts which allowed us to close the gap. Flo Dexter's movement down the court was brilliant and she sent in some great passes to our shooters. Evie and Annie worked tirelessly to get into some excellent shooting positions to receive these. Evie was able to keep her cool on a number of occasions to score, closing the gap to 2 with 2 minutes to go. NHS were scrambling and we were the better team, even scoring one for it to be rescinded on a tight call, which meant we just ran out of time to earn the victory losing 28-26 after winning the final quarter 9-7.

It is one of the best school netball matches I have ever seen, and the girls should feel so proud of themselves. We now head into the Plate competition where hopefully we can continue with this positive performance.

It was a superb afternoon with all of A team coming away with first place medals. No pressure Senior team! They are in action on Thursday 23 November.




BBL CHAMPION AWARD - Mr Hewitt, Deputy Headteacher - Academic
