This year we added a House Bake-Off competition to the usual line-up and were pleased to welcome back subject-specific events such as the Maths Challenge, Creative Writing and the historical Castle Competition. Our 'classic' events remained popular and it was great to see the Sixth Form students become more involved in the House system, particularly enjoying any extra opportunity to compete against the teachers... Students can win points for their Houses by competing in events but also by earning House Points through their conduct, participation and attitude in lessons around School. ## **SPORTS DAY 2024 – Report by the House Leaders**

On Thursday 4 July we saw students from Years 7 to 10 take part in the most competitive day on the House Calendar, Sports Day!

The day started off with grey skies and strong winds...however that did not hold back any of our competitors who got stuck in with their events straight away. Throughout the morning on the track, first up were the 1500 meters races, followed by the 100m, 200m, hurdles heats and then the 400m races. Whereas on the field, students were starting their events with high spirits, jumping and throwing their best.

Standout performers from the day were Yusuf Kebbeh (Behn) in Year 7 for his performance in the javelin, breaking a Sports Day Record with a throw of 32.20m. Another standout performer was Neve Brackenbury (Meitner) in Year 9 for her brilliant time of 13.1 in the 100metres, just 0.2s off a Sports Day Record. Year 10 performed spectacularly well and there were many brilliant performances. Standout performances go to Matthew He (Rorschach) for 11.82m in the triple jump, Oliver Byrne (Meitner) for breaking the Sports Day Record with a 1.70m high jump and Noah Humphries (Tinbergen) for achieving 11.3 in the hurdles, 0.2s off a School Record. Congratulations to Charlotte Smith (Meitner), who also broke two Sports Day Records in the 100m with 12.5s and in the 200m with 26.8s. Jay Bembridge (Tinbergen) had an excellent race in the 200m and broke the School Record with 22.9s. A special shoutout must also go to Lawson Capes (Tinbergen) who broke the Sports Day Record in both the shot put and 100m. The best race of the day was undoubtedly the Year 10 boys 100m finals where we had four students who either matched or beat Sports Day Records – well done Lawson Capes, Anesu Fashitidu, Artur Bubula and Jay Bembridge.

In the afternoon the whole school sat out on the field to cheer on their companions in the track finals. Students were getting into the House spirit by sitting with their Houses, wearing House vests and frequenting the ice cream stand which raised £140 for the World Wild Fund for Nature. To top off the day, the most competitive event was without a doubt the tug of war, in which Tinbergen defeated all opponents!

The final result was incredibly close between Behn and Rorschach, however congratulations to Behn House on the Sports Day win! Behn House and Mr Bowers were thrilled to claim the trophy and make a return appearance on the Sports Day Winners board. It was an excellent day and a big well done to everyone who took part.

## **ESAA ENGLISH SCHOOLS' TRACK AND FIELD CUP 2024**

### **NATIONAL FINAL AT NORTHWOOD STADIUM, STOKE ON TRENT - SATURDAY JULY 2024**

On Saturday, 6 July the Inter Boys athletics team returned the School to the pinnacle of team athletics to

compete in the English Schools Track and Field Cup Final. The event requires students to compete in both a track and field event with points being scored for the distances thrown, times run, and heights or distances jumped. The 14-strong team were impeccable throughout the long day, departing at 6:30am and returning just in time to watch England's penalties in the school car park on our return.

Initially, the boys started on the field events with Matthew He and Artur Bubula jumping 10.84m and 10.74m in the triple jump. In the long jump, Harrison Ward left to distance of 4.86m whilst Anesu Fashtidu jumped an impressive 5.28m. In the third of the jumps, Jack Caffrey cleared 1.41m in the high jump whilst Jack Carruthers remained in the competition until his seven jumps were completed, clearing a height of 1.68m. In the throws, Noah Henderson and Ben Alliston both through over 20 metres in the javelin. Nathan Bisalla threw 21.46m in the discus and Noah Humphries 25.53m. Monty Bage threw 6.45m in the shot but a phenomenally impressive throw from Lawson Capes saw him throw the 4kg shotput 19.15m, smashing the Championship record from 2001 by almost 2 metres. Lawson now holds both the Junior Boys and Intermediate Boys records in the championships.

After a break for lunch, the boys moved to the track events with Jack Carruthers and Noah Humphries stepping in to the 80 metre hurdles. Jack finished well in 13.8s with Noah, a fantastic 11.5s scoring 27 points for the team. Arguably the strongest event for the school, the 100m saw Lawson Capes run 11.2s, scoring 31 points and Jay Bembridge 11.4s, attaining further 29 points. Strong performances in the 200m saw Jack Caffrey from Year 9 run 24.5 seconds (22 points) and the Anesu 24.9s, attaining 21 points. In the 300m, just 0.1 seconds separated Artur and Harrison running 41.2s and 41.3s respectively. Noah Henderson and Monty Bage in the 800 ran 2:27.3 and 2:36.1, jointly attaining 31 points from the event whilst in the 1500 m, despite a fall in the first 300m, Toby ran an impressive 4:51.4 and Ben Alliston 4:59.6.

The day concluded with the relay where Toby, Jay, Matthew and Nathan achieved an impressive 49.6 seconds to add the final 21 points to the team total of 460. This placed the School 10th in the country.

Well done to all students who have participated in athletics this year whether at School, county, regional, or national level. We wish Max Roe, Thomas Preston and Lawson Capes all the very best for this coming weekend at the English Schools' Championships in Birmingham, where the best athletes from across the country come together to compete in the largest schools event of its kind in the world. Lawson will be looking to add his third English Schools' title in a row. Best of luck to all three.





## ANGLIAN WATER GIVES YEAR 8 STUDENTS A VOICE IN PROPOSED LOCAL RESERVOIR PROJECT – Report by Mrs Evans, Geography

On Tuesday, 9 July, the education team from Anglian Water came in to school to speak to year eight students about their plans for a new reservoir, located north of Bourne. The team came in earlier this year as part of year eight careers day and as we have maintained good links with them, they were eager to meet our students again to get their opinions on plans for this major water infrastructure project. Forms 8H and 8C were the lucky ones with Geography lessons on this day!

The session started with a presentation on the plans for the reservoir before the students soon got started on some interactive activities and discussions about different features of the site. The students were asked to rank their priorities by moving around the room to different locations and their oracy skills really shone through when they were asked to justify their decisions. Some students were able to explain why they would prioritise renewable energy generation or recreational land use with fantastic maturity and clarity. They then went on to come up with some ideas for particular areas of the reservoir, considering economic, social and environmental factors - something we encourage geographers to do in most lessons.

The session was very consultative and gave students the opportunity to have their voices heard. This was a lovely way to end the year in which year 8 geographers have focussed on a range of issues including water and food security, sustainable development and renewable energies. All of these big geographical ideas were touched on in this session with Anglian Water and hopefully gave students some ideas of how geographical ideas and concepts can be applied in the real world.



## LINCOLNSHIRE INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY'S STEM COMPETITION – *Report by Mr Dougall, Design Technology*

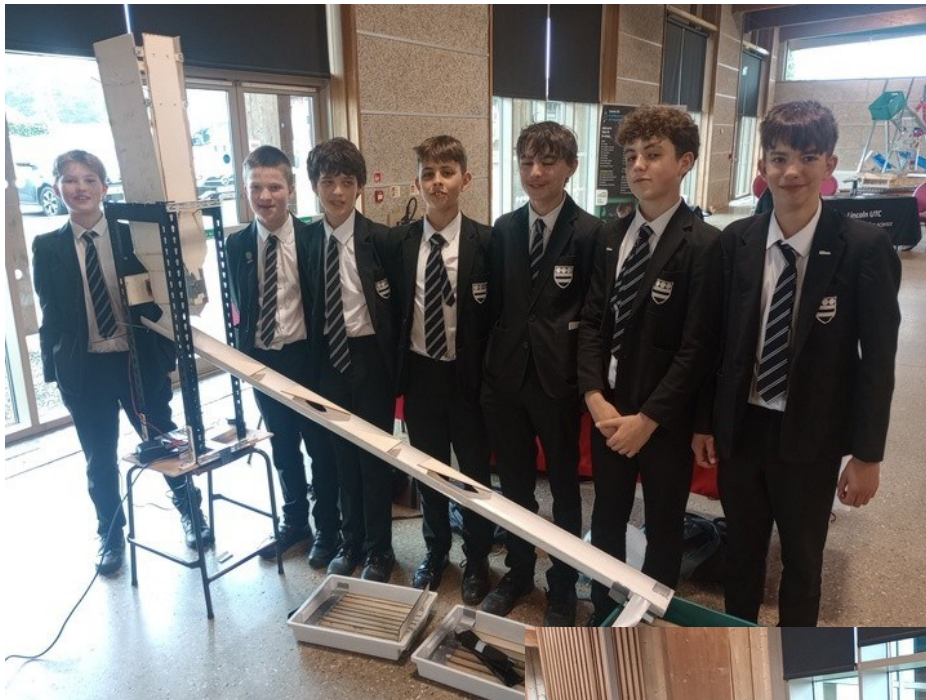
On Thursday 11 July, Mrs Elliott and Mr Dougall took twelve Year 9 students to the Lincolnshire Institute of Technology's STEM competition at the Epic Centre in Lincoln.

Both teams worked well solving this year's problem – to sort 150 aluminium tubes into three ordered piles. Achieving this goal helped develop enquiry, problem-solving and communication skills. The students' projects comprised an initial 'agitator' stage, which shook the tubes to encourage them to pass through a large hopper to be delivered one at a time. Next, a gravity fed system using a piece of recycled drain pipe sorted the pipes by size before they were then collected in custom-designed storage boxes where they were piled neatly.

Out of a large number of teams from across the county, our 'Green' team secured second place and our 'Red' team came fourth. The green team each received a £15 Amazon voucher, along with £100 for the Design Engineering department. Each student will receive a personalised certificate from the Bronze CREST award - well done to all.

## NATIONAL SPACE CENTRE TRIP – Report by Ruwanthi Hasan, 7D

On Monday 1 July, a group of Year 7 students went to visit the National Space Centre in Leicester. This award-winning space centre is the biggest in the UK.

During our adventure, we found a lot of interesting and fascinating new information. We also learned about the solar system and what life in space would be like. As we explored the Space Centre, we discovered what we could find if we went to space and learned about the speed, height, and location of planets and stars. In the Stellarium, we found a dark environment with a display of stars in our solar system which included buttons you could press to lead to a speaker, giving an explanation about its key information. We later went into the Planetarium where we watched a short film about astronauts and the environment you could find in space.

When we went upstairs, we found a rocket tower with 140 steps to climb, where some of the floors have rooms with information from space missions in the past and we found out what it was like to be in the Mission Control Centre of a rocket ship. The Mission Control Centre is a facility which manages space flights. When you first enter space, you become an astronaut. An astronaut is anyone who has flown into outer space mostly with the right equipment and training. The word astronaut comes from the Greek word Astron, meaning “star”, making an astronaut a “star sailor”. If you do not have the right equipment for a space mission, you could face many problems including extreme temperatures.
