Reflection of the Week

On Sunday, the Head Students and I took part in the Bourne Remembrance Parade, with a wreath laid once again during the Memorial Service in the Memorial Gardens. I reflected on how easy it is to let the lessons of History fade from the collective memory; how films and books go some way to help sustain our understanding of the past should we wish to take historical lessons on board... but also how difficult it is for young people today to appreciate the horror of war and the stark reality of human sacrifice on the battlefield. There is no easy solution to this, though I am delighted that the History Department is looking into the possibility of running a First World War Battlefields Trip for GCSE students in future years. However, pausing for two minutes every year to contemplate, for example, the psychological impact of being asked to climb out of a trench and advance into machine gun and artillery fire is the least we can do as a mark of respect and we must never forget the fallen, their friends and families and the extent to which we must continue to strive to prevent any future conflict.

On another note, today is Children in Need 2024 and we have been selling Pudsey ears through the week and raising funds for the event. We have also begun to collect Christmas donations for the Evergreen Care Trust and the Jefferson House Children’s Home, with a deadline of Friday 29th November for shoe box and gift bags to be brought in to school. To be experiencing the reflective power of Remembrance simultaneously alongside the optimism of fund raising and donation has made this a particularly poignant week, and I am grateful to all staff and students for their involvement in any of this week’s events.

Finally, well done to our Year 11 cohort that has completed the written components of their GCSE mock examinations today with language orals to be done next week. The last fortnight has provided the year group with invaluable lessons for what lies ahead in the summer and my thanks to Miss Atkinson and Mr Sutherland for their marshalling of the students and to all teaching staff now working their way through deep piles of marking. Whatever an individual’s set of results, the key is to draw lessons from the experience and use this as a springboard for progress and future success. Thanks also to the examinations team who worked so hard to ensure the smooth logistical running of the process while so much else has been going on across the school.

Crown Prosecution Service Barrister visits Year 12 Law students

The BGS Law department was delighted to welcome back Qamar Iqbal, a barrister with the Crown Prosecution Service (CPS), to talk to all Year 12 Law students across a morning of lessons. Qamar has been a great friend to BGS for a number of years and in recent times he has supported students with their preparations for Mock Trials, which the department tends to run as popular end-of-term activities.



Qamar gave the students a valuable account of the work of the CPS, with a focus on charging decisions, and he outlined the career opportunities available within the organisation. He also discussed routes into the legal profession, giving advice to students about the solicitor and barrister routes.



Students particularly enjoyed hearing about Qamar's own career and experiences in the Magistrates' Court and the Crown Court, and worked through some case studies that illustrated some of the difficult charging decisions that might be required. The annual highlight – which has become something of a tradition – is the trying on of Qamar's wig, which had more takers than ever before and was an indication of the extent to which students felt inspired by the visit. We had rooms full of budding barristers by the end of the morning!

Thank you very much to Qamar for returning to BGS to deliver this excellent learning opportunity for the students and for giving so generously of his time. Thanks also to Helen Elliot, BGS Careers Manager, for supporting the event behind the scenes and providing the photographs that accompany this piece.

Overall, I think everyone would say that it was not only a good educational trip but also a great way to have a bit of fun away from school.



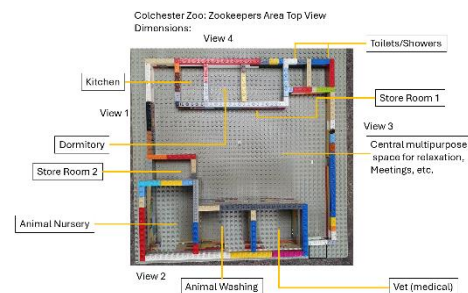
Colchester Zoo Stem Challenge Winners

For the last four years I have been part of [Junior Design Factory](#) run by [Creative Briefs](#). We meet on Saturday mornings via zoom and work on real life design projects with professionals and clients. One of our latest projects was to design the mixed African paddock for as part of their STEM Design Challenge.

Each member of the team had design lead and responsibilities for different parts of the enclosure (animal enclosure, zoo keeper area, visitor area). I lead and designed the zookeeper's area following the 'design process'. I started with initial ideas and basic sketches. I then researched zoo enclosure designs and interviewed a zoo keeper who gave us feedback and advised on requirements needed. I then developed my ideas and started building a 2D model out of Lego.



The model was designed approximately to scale and after several adaptations and feedback from the other designers, I built a 3D model, adding a cardboard roof with pictures of sedum plants, as well as skylights and solar panels to show what the roof would look like. To go with the model, I developed some information sheets showing materials, measurements, and equipment.

It was then all put together with support from the professionals at Creative Briefs and submitted to Colchester Zoo. All our hard work paid off and we won our category.

Oracy Focus: Y12 Discussion in Art

At the end of Term 1, Year 12 students from Mrs Welling's class were tasked with developing their oracy skills through an assignment, encouraging them to engage in discussion about their creative processes. The cohort were asked to complete a 5-minute presentation that outlined the inspiration for their work, including artist influences, research, films and articles. The task helped to build students confidence when communicating and highlighted the critical role of Oracy within the Arts.



A level Art student Summer Cain (artwork shown here) recognised the importance of the task: 'I was able to reflect on how my project was developing. I included what inspired me to start my project, the artists that influenced me, their artwork, and my own work.' Summer's chosen theme is loneliness and through the presentation task, students explored how different

themes in art such as loneliness, ageing, and distortion can be interpreted differently depending on personal experience. Summer was able to share ideas with her peers and felt 'the presentation helped to communicate the meaning behind each project and demonstrate how our themes may interlink.' By reflecting on the similarities between different topics and presenting their ideas to others, students gained a deeper understanding of how communication plays a vital role in art, both for the artist and the audience.

At the end of each presentation, students were also encouraged to ask questions about the project. Summer felt the feedback urged her to 'reflect on how my work is interpreted and the meanings behind it. From the discussion, I am now considering what mediums to use in future pieces.' For students, the assignment highlighted the importance of communication and how Oracy in the classroom can provide valuable insights that help to refine their work.



In conclusion, the task was an important opportunity for students to build their communication skills while reflecting on their creative processes. Through their 5-minute presentations, students gained confidence in explaining their work, sharing their inspirations and engaging in discussions with peers.

Cross-Country – Summary of the season so far

The season to date has been a busy one for cross-country with 6 large events impacting our students directly with more than 35 teams to be collated and almost 1500 BGS competitors across all events. Whilst a number of these have been reported on to date, there remains just the ESAA Cross Country Cup National Final in December before we break for Christmas.

Following the Inter House event in early September, students were selected for the first Fenland League races of the season. Here, the Year 7&8 students compete together, as do the Year 9&10 students with the positions of the first 4 in each age group forming a team score; the lowest team score being first and so on.

The Junior girls were led home by Sophie Alliston in 1st position, followed by another 8 BGS students in the top 17 places. Indeed, the girls were so dominant in this race and the second Fenland race that the A team are first overall, and the B team are in second, followed by Spalding High, King's Peterborough and a host of other local schools amongst the 16 teams entered. This also places 5 girls in the top 10 as individuals: an excellent team performance to date.

The Junior boys currently find themselves in 2nd place overall following the 2 races with Ciaran Mackay (Year 7) running impressively to lead the 7&8 boys home, closely followed by Finn Huddart. They sit in 3rd and 4th place to date as individuals, whilst as a team, the Junior boys are in 2nd place.

The Intermediate girls had had some challenging races and currently sit in 2nd place, just a handful of point behind Stamford. With one race to go that have the opportunity to overturn this in March when the competition resumes. Leah Graham has won both races to date with Lucy Preston, Edith Kaberry in 4th and 5th and impressive runs from Bri O'Boyle, Lois Cox and Ellen Richardson close behind.

The Intermediate boys are looking strong to win the team competition, currently in 1st place and the B team in 3rd. Monty Wild is 5th at present as an individual across the 2 races with Cayden Mackay, Kieran Selby and Freddie Neal also in the top 10 individuals.

Early October saw all 4 teams qualify for the Regional Final as part of the ESAA Cross Country Cup that took place last weekend. A full report of the event can be found next. This national competition has been a highlight and provided significant success in the past. Both Intermediate teams (9&10) will represent the school as one of just 24 teams in their age group from across the country on 7 December in Leeds.

The final day of last half term saw almost 80 students from School participate in the South Lincs Schools Sports Association Cross Country Championships. Not only was there a clean sweep of the team awards, but it is anticipated 55 students will be selected to represent South Lincolnshire at the County Championships on 18 January at Burghley Park and the chance to represent Lincolnshire at the Anglian and National Championships in February and March respectively.

Well done to all who have participated to date. Please continue to attend the running club, open to all, after school on Monday and Wednesday.

ESAA Regional Schools' Cross-Country Cup Final

On Saturday 9 November, five teams represented the school at the regional level of the schools cross country cup at the Grammar School at Leeds. From this race the top three teams were selected to compete at the National Final which will also be held at the same venue. It was perfect cross-country conditions being pretty dry underfoot and this led to some fast competitive racing throughout the day.



Our first team, the Junior Girls, held high hopes of qualifying with the team having reached the Final last year, and indeed several of the runners got quickly out of the gate to run a very competitive race. Finishing 3rd and within close proximity of the leaders was Sophie Alliston. It's been great to see Sophie go from strength to strength as she trains so consistently week in week out. Following Sophie there were many fantastic runs. Martha Shackell finished in 15th position, running a strong race throughout and overtaking many people towards the end of the race. After which, the third and fourth runners came in close positions to each other with Sofia Christoudias and Samaira Bajaj finishing 23rd and 24th. Despite these excellent positions the Junior Girls team unfortunately did not qualify for the Final, they were within five points of coming third which would've secured their space. Rounding up the group were 3 runners that also weren't far behind showing the team has great strength in depth with Madeleine Hobson and the two Year 7 girls Isla Tate and Avocet Williams who finished in 34th and 35th respectively.



The next race was the Junior Boys race with a much smaller team, leading the group was Ciaran Mackay who finished in 21st position despite being a year young in the competition which certainly shows excellent promise for the future. Ciaran's team was completed by Raffaele Santaniello, Joel Omitran and Louis Stubbs who competed well throughout.

Up next came our two Intermediate teams who again we felt had a good chance of qualifying from the Finals but would have to run hard races to do so. The Intermediate Girls proved to be a fantastic race from start finish, they really charged out of the pen at the start and secured themselves a good position. The first runner back was Leah Graham who consistently shows the impact of regular quality training in her races, she finished in 9th position. Shortly following her was Edith Kaberry who looked in excellent form throughout the race and did not finish very far behind at all in 15th. Lucy Preston came in third place in 25th; her running has really improved over the last year and continues to do so. After which the fourth position on the team was highly impactful with Bri O'Boyle completing another fantastic run from a person who is a footballer by trade. Bri finished in 28th position and was then followed by Lois



Cox in 36th and Ellen Richardson in 40th. A nervous wait followed the race but when the results were posted, we were pleased to see the girls had qualified in the third position, they've gained the opportunity to do it all again in four weeks' time!



Next up the Intermediate Boys, another team that would have to fight for qualification but stood a good chance to do so. Ben Alliston continued his impressive running form to set his team up for success, finishing in 10th position. Many good runs followed, in 16th position Cayden Mackay was strong throughout as was Monty Bage in 20th. However, the run of the day ultimately came from Noah Skinner (27th) who was brought into the team as our seventh position and ended up fourth back for the team. Ultimately, his contribution enabled his team to qualify for the National Final. The team was rounded up by the runners Zack Browne and Freddie Neal in 30th and 40th position respectively with all the boys qualifying for the national final in a few weeks' time.

Sadly, disappointment came in the last race of the day with the Senior Boys who we were hopeful but ended up just falling short. They were led by Tom Preston who came home in 1st position by a large margin and we were looking forward to seeing what Tom could do at the National level. Sadly, there were too many strong teams on the day to secure qualification. Toby Staines ran an excellent race, combative throughout (24th) Noah Henderson followed shortly behind in 30th. Miles Garrido rounded out the scoring for the team in 39th. With the fifth and sixth home Jack Knowles and Artur Bubula running competitive finishes to take positions at the end.



A mix of results for the day then, with some disappointment and some elation. Ultimately, it was the two Intermediate teams who were successful in qualifying for the next round. We look forward to four weeks from now when we can see what those teams can do. Thank you to the many parents who regularly make the trip to our various venues to support and thanks to Harry Hewitt who also showed his face to lend support to the teams. A reminder that Mr Sheppard continues to offer his running club Monday and Wednesday after school. This should particularly be utilised by those teams that qualified for National Final but indeed will be impactful for all runners who wish to improve and earn positions in future teams in future years. All are welcome to attend and build on the strength and successes of the last few years of our cross country squads.

I write to remind all students and parents that should a student feel they may not be able to participate in full or in part in a PE lesson, students should still attend with their PE kit. They will, in almost all circumstances, remain with their normal teaching group whether inside or

out and where possible participate in some form or another, often taking on roles such as leading warm-ups, officiating, analysing performance and in a number of situations, participating in part of the lesson depending upon the nature of the concern. This can ensure that minimal teaching content is lost and they remain part of the group as well as keeping students in the habit of bringing kit for lessons. It is important at this time of the year therefore students do bring their BGS tracksuit bottoms and ¼ zip top to keep warm as inclement weather is unlikely to prevent groups continuing with their normal activity. Remaining in School uniform (and School shoes) when on the muddy field may therefore see the student remain in damp clothing and wet shoes/socks for the remainder of the day. Please do rest assured we will discuss with the student which skills, activities and practices they feel that can/cannot participate in.
